

and made a noticeable difference. At the same time, the City of San Diego is completing clearing and planting of natives along the sidewalk as part of the Carmel Valley Road widening begun several years ago. The combined projects will greatly improve restoration of this area of the lagoon.

With your help we can remove a lot of this tenacious weed all in one day. So come join us January 17, anytime between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. Dress for the weather and to get dirty, possibly wet if you work near the water level in

the lagoon. Bring gloves, loppers if you have them, hat, sunscreen, drinking water and a dynamic attitude. You will have a great and whacky time!

### **SPECIAL DOCENT WHALE WATCHING KAYAK TOUR**

It's that time of year again!

Approximately 20,000 gray whales will pass by San Diego between December and March on their 7,000-mile migration. Whales migrate from the Bering and Chukchi Seas north of Alaska to Baja California for food and birthing. They typically come closer to shore during the southern migration, and return further away from shore with calves during the northern migration. This year Torrey Pine State Natural Park docents get a rare up-close look at these marvelous marine mammals and experience the ocean first hand from a kayak tour!

**WHEN: Saturday, February 7, 2009, 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.**

**WHAT: Kayak out from La Jolla Shores approximately 1 to 3 miles.**


**COST: \$57.50 for a single kayak or \$51.75 per person for a tandem kayak. Price includes wetsuit, booties, life jackets, paddles, guides and warm drinks and snacks upon return. Gratuity for guides is also included.**

The tour will be led by Hike-Bike-Kayak. While this will be an active tour, the pace will not be strenuous and no experience is required. The event is open to docents, family and friends. ## The Ant Lion

2008 was the year of the ant lion in Torrey Pines, especially in the Extension, where dozens of their sandy pits lined the trails. If you happened to watch one of these pits closely, perhaps you saw the ant lion's sharp mandibles protruding from the bottom.



The ant lion is actually the larval form of a damselfly (Myrmeleon). It is rough, squat and about 10 mm. long. They dig their pit by walking backwards in a spiral, flicking the sand away to make it cone-shaped. Once a pebble was dropped into an ant lion's pit and the larva emerged, backed up to the pebble and slowly pushed with its powerful hind legs, backwards up the steep slope to the rim and shoved the pebble outside.

The ant lion waits, hidden in the sand at the bottom of the pit until an unwary ant or other insect falls in. Then grabs it with its mandibles and holds it under the sand as it digests it with virulent poisons that pour from its glands. The resultant digested juice flows into the larva's body. The process takes about three minutes.

After a season of feasting on local insects, the ant lion spins sand and silk together to make a cocoon in which it pupates for six weeks. Finally it emerges as a delicate damselfly, ready to mate and produce a new generation of its kind.

## San Onofre Toll Road Dead in the Water

The U.S. Department of Commerce gave Californians a much-welcomed holiday present with the protection of San Onofre State Beach from the addition of a toll road that would have traversed the State Beach property. After months of deliberating, the Transportation Corridor Agency's (TCA) appeal of a February 2008 overwhelming California Coastal Commission decision, the Dept. of Commerce upheld the State's strong decision to protect the park. In their decision, the Dept. of Commerce found that reasonable alternatives to the toll road proposed by the TCA exist, and that the toll road is not

necessary in the interest of national security.

This is a great win for all park supporters – and for all Californians! Great thanks to the Save San Onofre Coalition, the thousands of Californians who turned out for the two San Diego-area hearings on the toll road, and YOU, for supporting CSPF as we waged the battle to save this important state park.

As we ready those champagne flutes for the toasting, we do so knowing that the story may not yet be over. We anticipate the TCA will try to sue and continuing pushing their ill-fated road. The tide is clearly against them but we must continue to match them, step-for-step, in any future attempts to push the toll road approval. □
